The number present at the Soldiers' Home at Quincy is constantly decreasing on account of deaths, discharges and furloughs. There are now 1,010 present. The deaths in March numbered 10. The Quincy Herald says that death will cut a wide swath from now on, and the indications are that the year 1900 will close the home.

Judge Thomas C. Sharp, editor of the Carthage Gazette, died Tuesday of paralysis. He had resided in Hancock county since 1840 and was one of several indicted and tried for the murder of the Mormons, Joseph and Hiram Smith, at the old stone jail in Carthage, but was acquitted. He was also a member of the constitutional convention of 1847.

Our old friend J. Sweeney, late editor of the Spring Valley Sentinel, has made a new departure, and is now editor of the Ladd Appeal, a new paper just started and published by George L. Hoffman. Ladd is a coal mining village in the township of Perry, Bureau county, northwest of the city of Peru. The people of the village voted a majority against incorporation a few days ago, due to personal motives, it is said. The Appeal is a good looking, well printed paper, and will be read while Sweeney is at the helm.
